Its objective is to facilitate planning, delivery and evaluation of study programmes and learner mobility through the recognition of qualifications and periods of learning.</p> <p>A system that helps to design, describe and deliver study programmes and award higher education qualifications. EWP	<p>Erasmus Without Paper</p> <p>EWP originated as a European project funded through Erasmus+ KA3 from 1/11/2015 till 30/10/2017 and again from 1/1/2018 till 31/12/19. It has now matured into an operational Network. Its chief goal still is to digitalise the administrative framework that underpins student mobility in Europe, enabling electronic data exchange and interoperability among diverse information systems. In March 2019 the European Commission announced that the use of EWP will be made mandatory from 2021 as part of the next Multi-annual financial framework (MFF) i.e. the next Erasmus programme.</p> <p>https://wiki.uni-foundation.eu/display/EWP/</p>

ECVET aims for better compatibility between the different vocational education and training systems in place across Europe and their qualifications.
